Dear Consultee,

Proposal to expand St David's Church in Wales Primary School from 140 places to 210 places to meet future demand for Church in Wales education.

The governing body consulted with prescribed consultees on the proposal to increase the capacity of St David's CIW Primary from 140 places to 210 places from September 2021. The consultation was undertaken in line with the requirements of the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 and the School Organisation Code 2018. The consultation was undertaken between 28 January 2019 and 15 March 2019. The aim of the consultation was to inform prescribed consultees about the proposal and provide an opportunity for feedback to be submitted. Of the 15 individual responses received, 14 were in favour of the proposal, 0 were opposed, and 1 provided no opinion either way.

On 21 March 2019, following consideration of the consultation report, the governing body determined to progress the proposal through the publication of a statutory notice. The statutory notice was published on the school and Council's website on 29 April 2019 and was issued to prescribed consultees and posted at the main entrances of St David's CIW Primary School. The School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 provides that anyone wishing to make objections to a school organisation proposal has the opportunity to do so. To be considered as statutory objections, objections must be made in writing or by email, and sent to the proposer before the end of 28 days beginning with the day on which the notice was published ("the objection period"). As the statutory notice was published on 29 April 2019, statutory objections had to be received by 27 May 2019. It was noted that there were 3 individual objections. The main concerns of objectors are summarised in the objection report together with the response from the governing body. The objection report is available to view on the School and Council website.

In accordance with the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 the governing body referred the proposal to the Council for final determination. On 15 July 2019, the Vale of Glamorgan Council's Cabinet approved the proposal to expand St David's CIW Primary School from 140 places to 210 places from September 2021. As a result a new building for St David's CIW Primary will be built on the current school site with capacity for 210 pupils.

In determining the proposal, Cabinet were satisfied that the proposal will:

- Enable the school to further improve while catering for a greater pupil population
- Maintain access and parental preference for faith provision in the area;

- Provide innovative and creative learning environments which are adaptable to change and will challenge and support children to reach their full potential.
- Increase the level of community access and interaction through the use of the school's educational facilities whilst meeting the needs of the school.
- The new building will meet BREEAM (Building Research Establishment Environmental Assessment Method) Excellent standards and be built to an EPC (Energy Performance Certificate) A rating.

The reasons for the decision in respect of the factors outlined in the School Organisation Code 2018 are as follows:

Quality and Standards of Education

The Council's clear ambition is that educational outcomes in the Vale of Glamorgan are the best in Wales and match those of the most successful authorities in England with similar socio-economic profiles. The proposal will help deliver that ambition.

The new school building and site will provide greater opportunities for curriculum development and pupil well-being. Pupils will have greater access to digital facilities and outdoor learning areas. Enhanced provision for students with special educational needs will be available at the school.

During the transition stage following the determination, the Council will take all practicable steps to minimise disruption for the public around the site by working closely with the contractors.

The proposal will provide much needed investment in St David's CIW Primary School, and will help deliver the transformational change necessary for all students to achieve their full potential.

Need for places and the impact on the accessibility of schools

The proposal will ensure that there is a sustainable balance between the supply and demand for primary school places for the long term. The proposal will increase places for faith medium education in the Western Vale.

Under the proposals there are no plans to change the Council's policy on the transport of students to and from schools. Free school transport eligibility will remain unchanged as a result of this proposal. The available safe walking routes to schools used for the assessment of free school transport will not alter as a result of this proposal.

The proposed new building will have improved access for disabled pupils and other users.

Resourcing of education and other financial implications

Funding is provided through the school funding formula which allocates the majority of funding for schools on the basis of pupil numbers.

This proposal will mean that significant capital investment will be made in establishing the new school and developing state of the art facilities. The estimated cost of the scheme is £4.185M. It is anticipated that part-funding would be provided by the Welsh Government under Band B of its 21st Century Schools Programme. The remainder of the capital funding would be contributed by the Council, utilising Section 106 Contributions received from developers.

As a voluntary aided school, the land that the new building occupies will be transferred to the diocese upon completion. The remainder of the site will be owned by the Council. This is the case

with the existing building.

Other general factors

The Equality Impact Assessment identifies that there would be a positive impact on persons with the protected characteristics of age, disability and gender reassignment/ identity. The proposal would support the school to ensure that it has the improved facilities to promote equality of opportunity and foster good relations between those with different protected characteristics.

There has been no perceived negative impact on the protected characteristics identified. The existing site is not fully compliant with the requirements of the Equality Act 2010 due to site constraints. Successful implementation of the proposal would enable compliance by providing a fully accessible building with gender neutral facilities.
