Purpose of Report:	To advise Scrutiny Committee of the progress relating to revenue and capital expenditure for the period 1st April to 30th September 2021 and the revised budget for 2021/22

Policy Framework:	This report is for executive decision by the Cabinet				
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Executive Summary:

- The revenue position for 2021/22 will be challenging with the continuing pressure for the service both operationally and financially as a result of the COVID 19 pandemic. This will impact both as a result of incurring additional expenditure but also from a loss of income. Funding has been provided by Welsh Government to cover some of the issues.
- A savings target for the year has been set at £6k.
- The capital budget for this Committee has been set at £33.215m.
- The 2021/22 budget has been amended for internal transfers and technical adjustments

Recommendations

1. Background

1.1 Cabinet on 22nd November 2021 approved the revenue revised budget for 2021/22.

2. Key Issues for Consideration

Revenue

- 2.1 At this time of the year the original budget is usually reviewed for any required adjustments and an amended budget is calculated. Appendix 1 to this report sets out the amended budget for 2021/22 relating to this Committee, together with the necessary adjustments to be made. These adjustments reflect charges for the use of capital assets, changes to inter-service recharges and transfers and pensions adjustments to comply with accounting standards. They have no overall effect on the net budget of the Committee and are accounting adjustments largely outside the control of services.
- 2.2 It is anticipated that services within this Committee's remit will outturn within budget at year end. A breakdown of this year's budget is shown in the table below.

- 2.3 Youth Offending Service It currently anticipated that this service will outturn on target.
- 2.4 Regulatory Services The allocation represents the Vale of Glamorgan's budget for its share of the Shared Regulatory Service (SRS). A separate set of accounts is maintained for the SRS and periodically reported to the Shared Regulatory Service Joint Committee. Income, particularly Licensing income, has been affected by the pandemic however as with other services, WG has funded such losses.
- 2.5 Council Fund Housing - The position with regards the housing of the Vale's homeless during the pandemic remains unchanged, ie. as well as the provision at Ty Iolo hostel, bed and breakfast accommodation and council, leased and shared properties in the private rented sector, 3 local hotels have been block booked through to March 2022 in order to accommodate the on-going need. Costs of these block bookings are being funded by WG until March 2022 but, to date, we have received no notification of funding beyond that point. The team are looking at a longer term strategy to deal with this situation should this funding cease or reduce beyond March 2022. The main pressure on the Council Fund Housing budget this year remains the CCTV budget in Community Safety where a previous savings target cannot be achieved due to on-going negotiations with the police service and the Police and Crime Commissioner regarding the future monitoring of CCTV output. Capital funding set aside by this Council for upgrading its CCTV equipment remains available, though progress has been held up, pending an outcome of the negotiations. As such, it is anticipated that unless this saving can be covered by underspends elsewhere within the service, the funding for CCTV shall be drawn down from reserves to cover this shortfall.
- 2.6 Private Housing Disabled Facility Grants fee income is showing signs of recovery since the restrictions have eased, but it still remains behind profile and it is anticipated that any shortfall in fees to the end of the financial year will again be claimed back from the WG.

2021/22 Efficiency Targets

2.7 As part of the Final Revenue Budget Proposals for 2021/22 an efficiency target of £6k has been set for services under this Committee and a breakdown is shown in Appendix 2. It is anticipated that this target will be achieved this year.

Capital

- 2.8 Appendix 3 details financial progress on the Capital Programme as at 30th September 2021. The following changes have been made to the Capital Programme since the last report to Committee.
- 2.9 Penarth Food Pod The Council has received an award of funding of £26,365 in relation to Tackling Food Poverty and Addressing Food Insecurity. The funding relates to the period 1 September 2021 to 31 March 2022. The purpose of the funding is to reduce food poverty and food waste to benefit the tenants and residents of Penarth, in particular the local community who don't have any immediate access to Foodbanks. The aim is to provide a facility that will act as an interest for social welfare with the objective of improving the health of tenants and residents living in the area. This is a capital grant and therefore emergency powers have been used to include this scheme with a budget of £26,365 in the 2021/22 Capital Programme to be funded by a grant from Welsh Government.

3. How do proposals evidence the Five Ways of Working and contribute to our Well-being Objectives?

- 3.1 The revenue budget has been set in order to support services in the delivery of the Council's Well-being objectives. It is therefore important for expenditure to be monitored to ensure that these objectives are being delivered.
- **3.2** The revenue budget has been set and is monitored to reflect the 5 ways of working.
- **3.3 Looking to the long term** The setting of the revenue budget requires planning for the future and takes a strategic approach to ensure services are sustainable and that future need and demand for services is understood.
- **Taking an integrated approach** The revenue budgets include services which work with partners to deliver services e.g. Health via ICF.
- **3.5** Involving the population in decisions As part of the revenue budget setting process there has been engagement with residents, customers and partners.

- **3.6 Working in a collaborative way** The revenue budgets include services which operate on a collaborative basis e.g. Shared Regulatory Service, Vale Valleys and Cardiff Adoption Service.
- 3.7 Understanding the root cause of issues and preventing them Monitoring the revenue budget is a proactive way of understanding the financial position of services in order to tackle issue at the source as soon as they arise.
